I am pleased to report that we increased our district membership by over 100 new members during the past Rotary year. This growth can be credited to the importance that clubs placed on reaching their membership goals as well as the chartering of two new clubs. Congratulations to all involved in converting a membership crisis into a demonstration of strength and vitality in District 5630!

We will continue to expand membership growth through the promotion and charter of new clubs, in both the traditional community based format and via electronic access (e-Club).

Please consider sponsorship of a second or third club in your community that might attract new members to Rotary service. We have seen a powerful interest by young professionals in support of "after hours" venues for their Rotary clubs.

The e-Club initiative that is under development will provide online access to Rotary membership for those smaller communities in our district that do not have a large enough population base to support an on-site club. We plan to canvass our smaller communities to gauge interest and to bring the services of Rotary to more rural settings.

Our e-Club will be available to the global population as well. We plan to reach out to former Rotarians and others who have been touched by the programs of Rotary through Group Study Exchanges, RYLA, and Youth Exchange.

Resources to promote greater membership retention through education will be the focus of Rotary information modules that will be accessible via our D5630 web site. These programs can be used to help orient new members and to expand the Rotary knowledge of all Rotarians. Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) programs to be offered at four convenient training locations will also provide a way for individual Rotarians to achieve a broad base

Mat Madson, Rotary International Assistant Regional Coordinator, spoke to participants of the District 5630 Membership Seminar in North Platte on June 30.

"Get everyone involved in the membership efforts of retaining and recruiting new members or in developing new clubs to reverse a 10-year trend in North American Rotary membership," said Madson.

Clubs can earn Premier Club recognition through many membership related activities. Using the Ignite Initiative, clubs can choose among elements and strategies that work best for their clubs. Clubs who participate in Ignite have the opportunity to become premiere clubs.

More information and materials will be available in the coming year.

Retain Current and New Members

Madson noted that any Rotarian can do at least one of three things new Rotarians need:

- 1) be a friend and mentor, or
- provide an assignment to ensure a sense of belonging, or
- 3) help new members understand Rotary.

zata reported that membership has increased in the District this past year, reversing the downward trend of the past five years.

District Governor Dian Edwards has set ambitious goals in developing new clubs – an e-Club and a new club in the Stuart and Atkinson area of Nebraska.

TRF Sets \$1 Billion Goal for Permanent Fund

I have been talking to you the last couple of years about Every Rotarian Every Year, Sustaining Members-- the \$100.00 per year club, Paul Harris Fellows and other ways that you can help the Foundation.

The Foundation has set a goal of \$1 billion in Permanent Fund assets by 2025, ensuring its capacity to meet future needs. Donors typically support the Permanent Fund through outright and planned gifts. Ways you can support the Permanent Fund are by making a bequest commitment, giving marketable securities, giving real state, making Rotary a beneficiary of a life insurance policy, mention Rotary in charitable trusts or annuities.

I want to dwell on the Bequest Society and how to become a Benefactor. This month I will discuss becoming a Benefactor. It won't cost you a dime to become a Benefactor. All you need to do is fill out a form and send it to the Rotary Foundation, 14280 Collections Center Drive Chicago, IL 60693 USA.

If you don't have a form let me know. I'll send you one. We don't have many Benefactors in the District. We need more. It is so easy and inexpensive that every Rotarian should be one. US Government Blamed for Ruining Anti-Polio Effort in Pakistan

Pakistani officials have chosen to lay blame for recent setbacks in polio immunization efforts. The CIA hired a Pakistani doctor, Ahakeel Afridi, to help find DNA evidence of Osama Bin Laden's family location by conducting a fake immunization campaign. Although these efforts were unsuccessful and contributed nothing toward finding Bin Laden, the doctor was later put on trial, convicted and sentenced to prison for spying against Pakistan.

The polio immunization effort

has come to be viewed as an American-sponsored program and the high anti-American sentiment in the tribal areas has taken the form of a ban against polio vaccinations declared by the Taliban coupled with their demand for an end to drone attacks. This has put 240,000 children at risk in North and South Waziristan.

Pakistan's Ambassador to the

Pakistan's Ambassador to the United States, Sherry Rehman, said "Afridi's actions have seriously jeopardized Pakistan's efforts to fight diseases, particularly polio among children." She also responded to questions from US Senators by adding that fears had crept in amongst tribal elders that the polio campaign might again be used to covertly trace and eliminate Taliban leaders. She said that because of CIA's actions through Dr. Afridi had put thousands of children at risk of contracting the polio virus and endangered the lives of health workers in Pakistan.

Polios Eradication Faces Serious Challenges

Polio eradication worker shot and killed in Karachi, Pakistan

A local community worker who was part of the polio eradication initiative in Pakistan was killed in Karachi, Pakistan on July 19th.

Mahammad Ishaq was shot and killed in the Gadap town area.

Polio immunization activities had been suspended in this area of Karachi earlier in the week after a shooting incident injured two World Health Organization staff members who were supporting the implementation and

monitoring of a vaccination campaign.

Until activities were suspended, Ishaq had worked with the national polio eradication effort as a Union Council Polio Worker for several months, helping to plan and implement vaccination campaigns to protect the most underserved and vulnerable children against this debilitating disease.

He was known for his dedication

and diligence to immunize all children against polio.

Ishaq was one of the thousands of people across Pakistan who worked selflessly in the battle to eradicate polio.

This was **not** a campaign organized by Rotary. Ishaq was working for the Pakistani government's own polio eradication program as a Union Council Polio Worker, but this did not protect him.

Nigeria Faces Daunting Challenges in Polio Eradication

The Independent Monitoring Board of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative reports that at least 2.7 million children in six persistently affected countries have never received even a single dose of polio vaccine. Nigeria appears to be missing many children in the northern Muslim areas because of migrant populations and porous borders with Niger and Chad, among others. Polio case numbers in Nigeria are resurging in 2012 and funds have been slow in coming for the needed immunization pro-

grams. New strategies may need to be thought out to make the most effective use of limited resources in the ongoing battle to eliminate polio where it has remained persistent in this area of Africa.
